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Senator Byars one question, if I could, or a couple of questions, just to explore how you feel about it.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Would you yield, Senator Byars?

SENATOR BYARS: Certainly will yield.

SENATOR BEUTLER: There are ways...different ways of going about this, I suppose. I think, for example, instead of fingerprinting everybody, if you...you could leave it to the discretion of the commission as to who they might want to fingerprint. I think some professions, for example, would tend to fingerprint people who have lived a long period of time out of state, whereas a young person who had lived all their life in Nebraska, there wouldn't be much need to do that since the State Patrol here in Nebraska could give you their records. That would be one alternative that might be somewhat less pervasive. Another alternative might be to let the employer decide whether or not they wanted to fingerprint an employee. Do either of those have any appeal to you, or do you feel that it's necessary to fingerprint everybody? I mean, as I understand the application process, real estate persons, real estate...applicants for a real estate license will be asked whether they've committed any misdemeanors or felonies as part of the application. And so what you're essentially trying to do is to determine whether they are lying on the application form or not. Do either of those alternatives have any appeal to you, or do you feel a need to fingerprint everybody across the board? And maybe I'd add one more line to that. If you feel a need to fingerprint everybody across the board, it must be because you feel somebody might have lied, and if, indeed, somebody in the future might lie, do you think it's more or less likely that they lied than somebody who is already a realtor and has filed an application form with an affidavit on it, and why wouldn't we go back and fingerprint them also in that event? Three questions, I think, were in all of that.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Byars.

SENATOR BYARS: Thank you. Thank you, Senator Beutler. On what I think is your first two inquiries as to my personal feeling
