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have a strong differing opinion with Senator Landis on this matter, and I would hope that you would, in the sense that you are the elected representatives of the people. They didn't elect us to elect somebody else to do the tax policy of this state. All of the analogies that Senator Landis made, in my opinion, are not good analogies. ALEC doesn't make binding tax policy for this state. Anything that ALEC proposes, it comes back through this legislative body and you and I approve or disapprove of it. The National Conference of State Legislatures doesn't make the tax policy for this state. Sure, we send representatives there and, sure, they recommend and participate in model legislation, for example, but they don't determine the tax policy of this state. Yes, ALEC is involved in model legislation and we send representatives there, but they don't determine the tax policy of this state. This governing body is going to be determining the tax policy of this state. That's completely different. It's like you saying to your constituents, if they come back and complain to you about something that governing board did with regard to tax policy...and remember again, they can change the basic document so they can do anything if they have enough votes on sales tax policy. And when a constituent of yours comes back and says, why the heck did you change that, and you look back and you figure out, well, golly, I didn't change that; yeah, it was a major policy decision but I didn't have anything to do with it, because this representative of the executive branch and this representative of the legislative branch that we sent back there to be part of our governing board, they decided to make a basic change and I had no part of it; I had no ability to affect it in any way; they made the change. And so you get ripped on that and you come in here and say, well, let's get out of this agreement; they can make tax policy and we have nothing to say about it. And the answer is going to be, we can't afford to get out of this agreement. This agreement is making us \$100 million a year. And our only tool for dealing with this is to get out of it, we're not going to be able to do that. And so I think you have to realistically look at what's actually happening here and distinguish it from the other matters that Senator Landis has pointed out to you and see this more like, for example, the United States sending a representative off to NATO. Do you think that person makes war decisions without checking back with
