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SENATOR BEUTLER: Yes.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Thank you. My concern is...I'm aware of some of the local squabbles going on, some that Senator Baker mentioned and some that he didn't, and my concern is...I didn't know there was a court injunction, but my concern is, with the coming mosquito season, if it does have some rain, and the West Nile virus, and those kinds of things that we're probably headed toward, as to who is going to be responsible for cleaning up some of these eyesores, if you will, across the state, and not only from that, the eyesore standpoint, but from the health standpoint. And I am concerned that...I know it's very divisive at the local level. I'm aware of...I'm not going to go into details, but I'm aware of one in particular that's become very divisive in a town. And it pits the town against each other, in many cases. Local people do not want to step forward. Damaging to businesses if they take a position, those kinds of things. My answer is then...or, my conclusion is then, it's better to have a state, in this case Department of Roads, although maybe they're not fulfilling their duties, but it is, I think, necessary in many cases to have the state involved in this and to get away from the local political situation, because it is very uncomfortable for small towns to take positions on this. It becomes very divisive, and then nothing gets done. And that is my chief reason at this point to probably support the kill. I...maybe something hasn't been done, but maybe it should be. And if I...I wish Senator Jensen was here. I...oh, there's Senator Jensen. May I ask Senator Jensen a question, if I have any time left, Mr. President?

SENATOR CUDABACK: You may. Senator Jensen, would you respond?

SENATOR JENSEN: Yes.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: I may...Senator Jensen, I may catch you off guard, but are you updated on the potential problems with West Nile virus this summer and the mosquito population, as far as the health departments are concerned?

SENATOR JENSEN: We had a briefing last year on West Nile virus,
