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And the citation there, and I haven't looked it up, Aboud v. Detroit Board of Education, 431 U.S. 209, pages 233 to 235. That's a 1977 case. I'm not going to belabor the fact. Senator Redfield had an epiphany between the time she spoke and the time I spoke. Now she understands. Now this is crystal clear. I didn't have that epiphany, and it's unclear to me. I submit that it's unclear enough to all of us that a yes vote on this IPP motion is called for. Thank you very much. I'd like to have a roll call vote.

SENATOR CUDABACK: There's been a request for a call of the vote...roll call vote. Everybody has not checked in yet, Senator Tyson. Do you wish to wait for them? Senator Schimek and Senator Dwite Pedersen. Did you wish to wait, Senator Tyson? He says we may proceed with the vote.

SENATOR TYSON: Reverse order.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Remind the body, it takes a majority of those voting. Reverse order has been requested by Senator Tyson. Mr. Clerk, call the roll. I said reverse order, Mr. Clerk, I'm sorry, by Mr. Tyson.

CLERK: (Roll call taken, Legislative Journal page 627.) 17 ayes, 26 nays, Mr. President, on the motion to indefinitely postpone.

SENATOR CUDABACK: The motion to indefinitely postpone was not successful. And I do raise the call. Mr. Clerk, next item on the bill.

CLERK: I have nothing further on the bill, Mr. President.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Further discussion on the bill itself? Seeing no lights on, Senator Redfield, you're recognized to close on advancement of LB 226 to E & R Initial.

SENATOR REDFIELD: Thank you, Senator Cudaback. I want to thank those that voted for this. I think that you'll be glad you did, because we've been very happy, I think, with the results of LB 29 in its fairness, and this will make it consistent if we
