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believe in it, and I don't care what you or anybody else says, I will die with that belief. Well, George Wallace was one of those who said, segregation today, segregation tomorrow, segregation forever. Then he got shot. And he changed. And all of a sudden, if we are to believe this man who had a traumatic, life-threatening experience, he began to see the world from a different perspective. It wasn't good to meet his maker with decades of hatred and hateful conduct on his conscience. It wasn't good, if there was a Saint Peter keeping a gate someplace, to go up there and have a book open, and day after day, week after week, month after month, year after year, recite to him every wicked deed he did against people simply because of their race, in order to advance his political career. He changed. I would like to believe that since human beings have the ability to think, human beings are possessed of intelligence, whether they use it or not, sufficient to analyze a problem facing this society, arrive at the conclusion that no member or group in this society should be set aside for shunning, violent mistreatment, and discrimination; having arrived at that conclusion, go a step further and make the vow to himself or herself that in the presence of those circumstances, any tool he or she possessed to eradicate that condition would be used for that purpose, so that our brothers and sisters who have been pushed below that level, that level below which we should allow nobody to fall, will be raised to a position...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...where they are accorded decency, respect, and ordinary treatment that one human being who is decent ought to accord to another. I am not going to be any the less if we stop discriminating against these people. Nothing is taken from me. But something is added to all of us. We will have expanded the reach of the human family in this state by including everybody who is a human being. And that's all that I'm trying to do.
