criminal offense. And then as time passed, that changed and things got a little more in proportion, for example. So I'm just suggesting some caution here. Secondly, Senator Mossey, I'd ask your reflection again on this. It says...

SPEAKER BROMM: Time. Thank you, Senator Beutler. Senator Wehrbein.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Mr. President and members, I was going to make some comments on the results of increased convictions, and I am on this bill so I support the bill. My concern is perhaps a little bit along what Senator Beutler has been talking about, although not directly in the proportionality. My concern is probably the increase in prison population as a result of this, and I wonder if Senator Brashear had any comments. I just found out from fiscal, we don't really have a good database here that would be helpful. I looked at the fiscal note, and it says...it said here, Department of Corrections Services advises the fiscal impact to the department is not determinable. And I find that a little unfortunate, but then I find out that we have a good record of arrests through police departments across the state. We have a pretty good record in the conv...in the corrections but we don't have a statewide database through the district court system, if you will. And I don't know whether Senator Brashear would have any comments on this. It would look to me that, even though I support this, it looks like to me we really don't have a good handle. But it has to probably increase our correctional system load if we make a class...if we use a prison sentence here. Kermit, Senator Brashear, would you have any comments on that?

SPEAKER BROMM: Senator Brashear.

SENATOR BRASHEAR: Yes, Mr. Speaker. Thank you, Senator Wehrbein. I appreciate the opportunity. All of the stars may not be perfectly aligned, but perfect is sometimes the enemy of good. And I'm not concerned about being able to put a greater penalty on people who possess child pornography and we'll get everything else straightened out as we go.
