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know who it's going to be. They will say what a copout, Cudaback, what a copout. And the other person, he may say, well, I'm going to vote, you know, the other way. I'm going to make the decision myself here and not allow it. You mean you won't let the people...you want to let the voter decide. So you can't read the public. You can't read them on this issue, and I don't know what makes that. But you can't pick them out. You can't read the public. One will say, let the public decide. The other one will say, you decide. It goes back to the old issue, why was I sent down here? Why was Jim Cudaback sent here...down here? Because they thought I was knowledgeable and could vote and discuss the subjects intelligently? Don't answer that, my friend here. But, hey, anyway, was I sent here for that purpose? Was I sent here because they thought I would listen? You know, that goes back to that argument, why was I sent here? To make my own decision, or I will listen to the people? I guess on this one, this issue here, it's a major, major issue. We can't have everybody voting on every issue. We know that. We can't. I mean we'd have initiatives here, and referendums here. We'd have all kind of deals. Everybody can't vote. But this issue here, it probably is one of the main issues, so probably we should send this to the people. I know I'm going to get letters on this, again, like I did and on every other issue of importance. But maybe we should give it to the people. What's wrong with that? Can you lose? I'm going to say, well, you did it, I didn't do it. So I guess I'm going to vote give it to the people. On the ballot, I'm probably going to be no. On this issue, I probably should just sit down while I think I'm ahead. Maybe, I'm not. I didn't know so many people read the papers, as my statement here a week or so ago. But I found out a lot of people read the papers, you know, and maybe that's good. But anyway, we make statements, well, I guess we have to be responsible for what we say. So I'm saying I'm going to put it on the ballot and let the people do it. On the ballot I'm going to say no. With that, Mr. Speaker, I'll yield you the rest of my time.
