Let's compare that to, quote, an area of the state that lies within two miles of an adjoining state which allows gaming. Doesn't seem ennobling, does it? Or compare and contrast these. To secure these rights, and the protection of property, governments are instituted among people, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed. And now we're going to insert: no such zone may contain lands within the limits of an Indian reservation in Nebraska of a federally recognized Indian tribe recognized as of October 1988. I think we ought to slow down, and before we divide the money and ask where it is...no offense, my good friend Senator Jensen...before we worry about how many million pounds of beef we'll sell and how much tourism we'll do, let's try and get it right in the document. I...putting aside our personal preferences and where we are and how this all might end up...and you know, this is the sausage making process...this interdiction zone drives me crazy. Have you looked at it carefully? I'm sure you have. I know you have. This is the longest two-mile stretch in the western world. Have you figured out why it's so long? Because we have to pretend to be limiting it, so there's only one zone. We don't want it to be one two-mile by two-mile zone in Douglas County, next to the Iowa casinos, because that would leave everybody else out. So...I may not get through this. (Laugh) So it's not one two-mile by two-mile zone. But we can't very well say, as many zones as we can possibly create, because everybody knows what we'd do with that. And we don't want to make it look as bad as it is, which is a zone that starts wherever the Legislature determines that it is, and runs contiguously all around the state for as long as it can possibly go on, until it has to end at Wyoming, because they don't have the requisite precondition, gambling, gaming.

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR BRASHEAR: We can't...we put this in our constitution, we won't be able to ever change, without a constitutional amendment, how wide it is. Can you imagine what this is going to do for the price of every scrub piece of land, if we had any scrub land in Nebraska, that lies all along the South Dakota, Iowa, Kansas, Colorado border? See, there's only one place we won't have this two-mile interdiction zone, and that's...until
