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do have gambling, we are the ones that are going to have to vote to tax those same people additional taxes to pay the unmet social costs that this form of activity invariably brings. And this is not a matter of conjecture. Any reports you hear from states where they have gambling, they talk about increased police costs. They talk about increased social costs in the form of compulsive gambling reeducation. Senator Jensen rose on the floor yesterday and talked about the increased taxes that Council Bluffs has imposed and intends to impose. Was I the only one listening to that? Where is the cornucopia of good things pouring out on Council Bluffs? They are the ones that have to raise the taxes. But they shouldn't have to. They've got all those wonderful casinos over there doing all these wonderful things. Senator Schimek sent this thing out. I don't know where these figures came from, but I don't believe the first one. I'd like to see some verification. Somebody took their crayons and put this nice picture. And of course, it represents unity, unity of \$215,600,000. Those are the benefits of gaming. What are the costs of gaming? That is what is important. There is only so much disposable income at the hands of any single individual. And a man...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR TYSON: ...or a woman can take their paycheck and they can pay rent or a house payment or groceries or taxes or whatever, their credit card bills, or they can take it over and dump it in and get nothing back for it. That was the definition of gambling that was given by Samuel Johnson, who was quoted by Senator Chambers in here. He said, gaming...and I didn't realize until I read there that that was an older word than gambling in reference to this...gaming is the transfer of wealth without producing an intermediate good. You take your chance, and the chances are weighed heavily against you, and you lose, you have nothing. At least if you make your house payment, pay your credit card bills, distribute your income there...

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time.
