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say, well, you know, I'm not a gambler myself, but we need the tax revenue. Now, maybe they're telling the truth and they really don't gamble themselves and, like a lot of people, they're just looking for someone else to be taxed rather than them. They want the services that government provides, but they want somebody else to pay the tax. Or maybe in fact they do enjoy gambling, and that's fine. So I had to ask myself, in looking at this bill, and saying, well, would this provide an opportunity for someone who really just wants to be an American and make a choice for themselves? And then I thought, well, I live in Omaha. And if we're talking about a two-mile border, we're talking about, about three minutes in difference in driving time. Do they have the opportunity in Omaha if they want to go to a casino? They sure do. There's three of them right across the river. So the opportunity is there for them. Okay. What about the rest of that two-mile border around the state? Do they have opportunities? Well, what's the likelihood they're going to build a big destination casino in a county with a small population base? Probably pretty nil. So in fact I think the opportunities to gamble do exist for people. But the issue still goes back to, they're looking for what they feel is tax relief. They think that our money from Nebraska is going over to Iowa and they're losing it. So I passed out to you a handout. It comes from "Stateline.org," and it really compares the budget holes in the states. And I think it's interesting, when you look at Nebraska, you see that our hole is 13.4 percent. That ranks us number 15 in the nation. But right next to Nebraska, what do you see? You see Nevada. And how big is their hole? Nineteen point nine percent. They rank number four in the nation. Now, Nevada is a destination gambling state. Omaha never will be. I don't imagine they're going to be able to advertise the state of Nebraska and say, you know, book your plans now, book your flight, and go to Nebraska so you can gamble. Because where are they going to go? They're going to go to Las Vegas. They're going to go to Atlantic City, where there are a lot of casinos and a lot of action going on. And yet even with outsiders coming in and paying their tax burden, Nevada has a bigger hole than Nebraska. And if you look on-line at the newspaper articles going on in Nevada right now, they're talking about raising every single tax there is. And they do pay taxes in Nevada, even though people think they do not. So
