what our primary differences are. It's primarily in the area of aid to education, which is a large one, and also public assistance to state ward education. Those are two huge differences between us and the Governor. So that accounts for a large amount of that difference. The other one is that we did not take into account an increase in cigarette tax, which he would have in his budget. Now, that's just a quick overview. It's not completely explanatory of the differences, but it does explain a lot of it. On page 3 is the potential, option, possible, whatever you want to call it, of what revenue may...what those kinds of things are, and what numbers they bring. No recommendations, just as...it's background, or for your information. And the spending items in the bottom show where some of our significant differences...our increases are. And as you can see, easily, that it's heavily on TEEOSA, in the difference between the cuts that we took and TEEOSA spending or aid to education, mostly because it implies a property tax increase. But I'll go into that in lots of detail tomorrow. The other one I want you to call your attention to is page 13, which is the significant increases and reductions that we have shown. And I'll...it may not be too obvious to reconcile between page 13 and 3 real easily. But if you want to see what the significant increases are this year in our spending proposals, in our proposal, and the significant reductions. And they may take some explanation, which I'll do tomorrow morning and at noon. But just to say, quickly, that there are some proposed reductions that will be very, very, very, very painful to take. So this is a very...I don't know what word to use...a very serious budget proposal at this point. I guess that's all I'd have. I want to remind them, tomorrow morning the briefing is on...in detail. That's all I have, Mr. Speaker.
