talked about the word "casino" and that it could mean a bingo hall, it could mean a gaming hall, it could mean a number of things. It doesn't have a definition. Friends, if the dictionary served us well for definitions, we'd never have to put a definition into law. But we always put definitions into law wherever we can in order to cut out litigation because the dictionary definitions, all they do in their vagueness, is to encourage litigation. And what we're doing with this amendment, in an effort to be simple, we've lacked clarity and it's confusing. Let's go to just the second word. We talked about casino, then it says style, casino-style gaming. It doesn't say, note, that the gambling has to be in a casino. I want to repeat that. The gambling doesn't have to be in a casino. It just has to be casino-style. What is "casino-style?" Is bingo casino-style? Are the raffles that are charitable gamings right now, are they casino-style? Since we don't know what casino means, it's hard to know what casino...it's even more impossible to know what casino-style means. But then it goes on to say that it shall include, not that it's limited to, but it shall include. Now not limiting it makes a big difference because that means that this opens up the possibility it can mean any game...any game of chance. It says it shall include games of chance played for money, credit, or any representative of value. That's the next part of the definition. Well, in the current constitutional language, there is another definition of game of chance, and the question is going to come up, do they both mean the same thing or do they mean something different? Because in the very first part of the constitutional amendment right now, it says, except as provided in this section, the Legislature shall not...

SENATOR BEUTLER: ...authorize any game of chance, when the consideration for a chance to participate involves the payment of money for the purchase of property, services, or a chance or admission ticket or requires an expenditure of substantial effort or time. So we already have one definition of games of chance in the current...in that very same constitutional
