And so when Senator Schimek said we should all get together and try and find out something that would be approved, I guarantee you I have something drafted on my desk that would pass the vote of the people, guarantee it. It's a bigger issue than gambling in the state of Nebraska, much bigger. It's probably every door that Senator Friend knocked on said...

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time.

SENATOR ERDMAN: ...this is an issue versus gambling. Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Erdman. Senator Burling on the committee amendments, followed by Senators McDonald and Johnson.

SENATOR BURLING: Thank you, Mr. President. Members of the body, I've enjoyed the discussion very much, a lot of good information from both sides, and I try to think what I could contribute to the discussion. I have some things that maybe haven't been said, and some things that I'll repeat that have been said. We've all heard some figures thrown around, both we've read them in the paper, we've heard them here on the floor, figures to do this and do that. And some figures that I would just add to your portfolio, if you're interested, deal with community colleges. Community colleges in Nebraska have about a tuition and fee of \$55, approximately, for...per credit hour, and in Iowa they are between \$60 and \$100 per credit hour, so the community colleges in Iowa are not benefiting from the casinos. I've heard from incarcerated people. I have visited with incarcerated people who are there for armed robbery because of gambling addiction and they're asking for help and they're sending me e-mails and letters and phone calls to not support these proposals that we're discussing now. And we've already heard several people talk about the addiction problem in the state. And I guess I don't want to be a part of casting one vote that would contribute in any way to increasing activity
