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SENATOR McDONALD: Okay. That's all I have to say. Thank you.

PRESIDENT HEINEMAN: Thank you, Senator McDonald. Senator Stuthman.

SENATOR STUTHMAN: Thank you, Lieutenant Governor and the body. I just have one question for Senator Schrock. Some of his questions...some of my questions were already answered prior to this. But the question that I have is, this 500 piece, these 500 tires, does that relate also to the ag? Are they exempt?

PRESIDENT HEINEMAN: Senator Schrock.

SENATOR SCHROCK: No, the ag tires are not exempt. But, you know, if you've got that many tires on hand for your silage pile, that would be exempt.

SENATOR STUTHMAN: They would be exempt?

SENATOR SCHROCK: Yes.

SENATOR STUTHMAN: Because I know 500 tires for a silage pile are not very many. There's several instances where I know they've got thousands of tires that cover their silage piles. So would that create anything or any problem for these individual feeders that pile their tires on the end of the place, or on the corner of a field during the summer months, or prior to the event, when they cut silage and recover their piles? Will this...I know there are going to be a pile, and there will probably be 1,000 tires in a pile. Will this be of any problem?

SENATOR SCHROCK: No, it will not be. But I will tell you this, Senator Stuthman. I can see the day when we may require those people to split those tires so they don't hold water. And actually, it would be a lot easier for them to handle, because throwing these tires on top of silage piles and wet corn piles has got to be quite a task. So I can see the time when that might be coming, but this bill does not do that.

SENATOR STUTHMAN: Okay. Thank you. I will also agree that I
