going to feel. And the other side of that is, is making sure that in the process of doing that, that the system is going to be either held whole, as far as the funding, or increased, depending upon how the state deals with the funding of the foster care program with the additional opportunity of accessing the IV-E funds. So, again, with Senator Raikes' amendment, if you want to define "relatives" in the bill I think, you know, we're agreeable to do that. I think the discussion on the process could come on Senator Jensen's amendment that he'll offer that does give the clarification of what it actually means to waive these requirements. But again, you know, we're making sure that we're looking out for the best interests of the child. I think if you would throw out the licensing requirement for everyone, I think that's not in the best interests of the child. But I think that you can look at this situation. The goal, obviously, is to encourage and recruit more relatives to become foster parents to take care of their own family members through this process and then, from that standpoint, looking at them from a licensing and training requirement, and Senator Jensen's amendment kind of clarifies some of those discussions as far as what that should look like in order for us to be able to make sure that this is the best process available.
