SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...to have the law protect people against discrimination based on sexual orientation. An amendment that would include my language is not skewed, it is not difficult to understand, it is not unreasonable, but there is such a depth of either fear or antipathy toward people based on their sexual orientation that a necessary definition is to be eliminated once it had been adopted by the body. SENATOR CUDABACK: Time.

It doesn't look like to me it falls in the place that it does what you are talking about doing. Now I could be cleared up on that, but I just wanted you to know that. I don't know if you're going to withdraw it. If what you ..what you are after, I think it's not in the logical place, and I just wanted to say that. Thank you. You can have the rest of my time, if you'd like it.
