changing the way they operate, nothing like that is intended, and the reconciliation of those interests can be done quite easily between now and Select File, if everybody is working in good faith to do that. And everybody who's interested in putting this casino proposition on the ballot will be working...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR BEUTLER: ...in good faith to do that, because none of them have any intent to interfere with these other activities. So I think that everybody should keep in mind that that can and will happen, and that we ought not to litter our consideration of these two different philosophies, represented by LR 11 and LR 14, we ought not to confuse the decision on that issue with these technical amendments that need to come by Select File in order to clarify relationships with others who are protected by the constitutional provisions previous to this time. They are two separate processes. They are all envisioned. We're moving towards it. Everybody can come in and say what they think needs to be protected. So there's nothing unorderly about the process. And I appreciate Senator Mines' question, that can be handled that way, as well as Senator Brashear's...

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time.

SENATOR BEUTLER: ...question. They are questions to be decided by Select File.
