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now certainly sending center-pivot irrigation systems all over the world. He did it by using the kind of leadership that I appreciate, and that's working with employees and not just the top-down approach, but using everybody's input. And I think that's real important when we're looking at the Game and Parks Commission and how they operate, how they set some of the hunting and fishing guidelines and requirements. It's important to the sports people's clubs and organizations so that the people who frequently don't feel represented or that they don't have an opportunity to be on these boards and commissions can at least feel that they have some say in them. And we did hear testimony in the committee that the sports, they said men, but sports persons did support this nomination, and that has not always been the case. So I think he's a good nomination and I do rise in support of Gary Parker for the Game and Parks Commission nomination. Thank you.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Preister. Senator Schimek. Senator Schimek waives. Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President...Mr. Speaker and members of the Legislature, I would like to ask Senator Schrock a question.

SENATOR SCHROCK: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Schrock, I think I'm correct in this. I read in the paper the other day that a woman died who had been the first woman to serve on the Game and Parks Commission. During your recollection, has there ever been a woman appointed to the Game and Parks Commission?

SENATOR SCHROCK: Yes, Gloria Erickson from Holdrege, Nebraska.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: How long ago?

SENATOR SCHROCK: She was appointed by Kay Orr just a couple months before Governor Nelson was sworn into office, so she served in the early nineties.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Since then, has there been one that you're aware of?
