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SENATOR JANSSEN: ...for quite some time, Mr. Speaker?

SPEAKER BROMM: ...now we'll go to the next light, which happens to be yours, Senator Janssen.

SENATOR JANSSEN: Well, then I can...I guess I can just keep right on going then. I believe that we are starting to see some compromise in this body with the votes yesterday, and I know some of them were probably just to get the amendment passed, but I would appreciate those who...those who have showed their support to continue to do so, at least or I would like to see you all the way through of course, but to get it moved off of General File and over to Select File. And then any criticisms that those of you have that you think that we can do by tinkering with the legislation a little bit, if you have concerns, it's my intention then that we could address some of those concerns. I'm sure we can't address all of them. But I would like to say that the cities...we are going to be bringing in, if we have at least some casinos in the eastern end and some in the western part of the state, I look at what other states have added to their coffers and it's a considerable amount of money. Right now, we have offered aid to cities of \$13,148,625. Now that is aid to cities. Aid to counties was over \$5 mill...about \$5.5 million. Looking at the revenues at a modest...in a modest way compared with some of the other states, in my opinion, that's where these dollars should go, is back to aid to local governments and possibly to schools. That money, those receipts, even if you take a modest look at it, the state of Iowa was over...I have the figures here somewhere but that was over \$200 million. Now that would look pretty good right now. I think the cities and counties and schools, if that were divided up equally among them, would make a big difference, would make a big difference in their budgets this year. I do have the figures right here. Last year, Iowa's gaming revenues generated from those casinos across the state was \$216.9 million. Another neighboring state, which is Missouri, those receipts were \$322 million. And South Dakota's was smaller. They have a smaller tax. Tax on their gaming was \$4.5 million. Colorado's was \$92 million. So these are dollars that I think need to be in Nebraska, and how many of those were Nebraska dollars that were going into the casinos in Council
