intentional act, I guess, and it causes a nuclear catastrophe of some sort, we wouldn't be indemnifying against that. Is that correct? So we wouldn't be indemnifying them against a willful act that caused some sort of major accident.

SENATOR SCHROCK: No. No.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Okay. So their going to have to have insurance against willful acts. Is that right?

SENATOR SCHROCK: That's correct.

SENATOR BEUTLER: And we would have it for negligence and gross negligence, anything that related to negligence? Is that the way it would be?

SENATOR SCHROCK: I'm not sure of that, Senator Beutler.

SPEAKER BROMM: Time. Senator Tyson.

SENATOR TYSON: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Ladies and gentlemen, we have a nuclear power plant in Brownville, we, the people of Nebraska, NPPD, and that plant is not being very well run. And because it's not being very well run, it's in the second lowest category that the Nuclear Regulatory Commission puts out. And so the directors of NPPD, described by Senator Brashear as part-time, not very knowledgeable, marginally compensated people...I thought he was talking about us...but they have decided to do something about it and they come across a group, Nuclear Management Company, who is managing eight stations, six of them in the highest performance category, two of them in the second highest performance category, and they have made a deal with them to come in and operate Cooper Station, where they're not doing a very good job right now. And because we're not doing a very good job right now, I would imagine we would have a much higher possibility of liability for negligence. That makes an awful lot of sense to me, especially if the new management group, NMC, is producing electricity in other plants, and for profit or not for profit doesn't amount to anything as far as the cost of product. They're doing it for \$3.16 a megawatt than we are. And I would point out something to this body. I
