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five-thirty every morning, and after about a week of this, I said, you know, why are you getting up at five-thirty? Why are you going to school so early? And he said, well, the girls would like to have a team but they don't have a way to have a coach because the coaches were compensated as part of their salary for coaching the teams. So he was the volunteer coach. And the girls also couldn't have a practice time other than six o'clock in the morning because the boys' teams had all the practice times. Well, we've come a long, long way with women's athletics, and I just don't want to send a message from the Legislature, and I know that...I understand Senator Chambers, where he is coming from. I'm there intellectually, but I also have a concern with policy being set by the Legislature that doesn't treat the other athletes, who may have some of the same financial concerns, who train, who get injured, who work in other sports, from having the same opportunity for a stipend. And I think that's a fairness issue for all the athletes, but I also have a little bias for the women athletes, who've just come into their own in recent history, if you want to call it that, and should be recognized for their hard effort, for their constant training that goes on in their sports, and for anyone who might have an injury as is playing a difficult sport. A lot of the sports, and I'm...I didn't play in sports. I'm one of the people from way back when that just didn't do that, and there weren't that many opportunities for me. But I do know that the other sports that I've watched athletes, my own children and other athletes, women and male athletes, have lots and lots of work, lots and lots of injuries, lots and lots of potential conflicts with their personal time that they could be earning money. And so I hope Senator Chambers will address the issue...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR THOMPSON: ...of fairness, and a legislature taking a policy that doesn't recognize the other athletes who are governed by the NCAA.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Thompson. Senator Bromm.
