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that I echo an awful lot of what Senator Thompson has just articulated, probably better than I could. When I started thinking about this, I began to have questions about the fairness issue and the message it sends to not only female athletes, women athletics, which has come a very long ways, but also, too, those sports like baseball, basketball, softball, wrestling, which I understand that most of those athletes don't have full grant-in-aid scholarships. Many of them have 30 percent or half or less than a full...less than full room, board, tuition, fees, and books. And yet I read the paper about the baseball team, and how many times they are here or there for two or three game stands. How many days of college do they have to miss in order to play baseball and then make that up somehow? Football, fortunately, usually, usually occurs on the weekends. I know they spend a great deal of time and they make a lot of sacrifices and I'm a great fan of them. But I'm also a fan of these other sports, and I'm also a fan of women's sports, and especially the volleyball and the great amount of excellence that they have shown and the discipline and the coaching, and I just truly enjoy watching them. But to me, and I respect Senator Chambers bringing the issue to the forefront in an effort to try to get some changes made in the NCAA governance and really the fairness, the way he approaches it. I understand that, but I can't ignore the lack of fairness that this would bring about to these other sports, if actually something were to happen along the lines that he is suggesting. I would also...I know that he has championed this for a long time, but it seems that there have been some changes in the NCAA guidelines since he started on this course, and he may deserve some credit for bringing some of that about, too. But I think it'd only be fair to recognize some of those changes. My understanding is that now that a student, who is an athlete, can receive up to \$4,000 Pell Grant, and that does not...there is no restriction on how you can spend that. That can be used for things that they need. I understand now that they can work effective in 1998 and earn up to \$2,000 in addition to their full athletic scholarship during the school year. And employment during the summer and during vacation is unlimited. And the NCAA doesn't monitor that. UNL does but the NCAA does not. I also understand that they can, they couldn't used to do this, but they can now offer instruction to students or kids or YMCAs and receive pay for
