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that athletic tutoring, and they couldn't used to do that. And that can happen during the school year. That does, I think, fall into that \$2,000 limitation on employment during the year. As of 1997, there is now a special assistance fund available to athletes that wasn't there before that can provide up to \$500 for each Pell eligible student athlete based on need once again, and that could include clothing and...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SPEAKER BROMM: ...essential items, travel expenses for family emergencies. Then there is an incidental expense waiver that's been effective since '95 that would allow the university to help pay for flying to and from family funerals or emergencies that didn't used to be there. Seniors can make some money, once they've exhausted their eligibility, with signing autographs and that kind of thing. And then there is a new fund, and I don't know what this is yet, but a proposed Educational Opportunity Fund that's going to be available that hasn't been available. So there is progress being made. Are we there yet? No. But should we leave the other sports and the women's athletics behind? I can't do that. There is just too much...that's too much of a message that I can't rationalize that. I could certainly support a resolution or something like that, but to place something in statute...

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time.

SPEAKER BROMM: ...that I think has these characteristics I have a hard time. Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Bromm. Senator Friend, followed by Senators Landis, Engel and Chambers.

SENATOR FRIEND: Thank you, Mr. President. Members of the Legislature, I wanted to continue. Senator Chambers had brought up what I had mentioned about a possib...this whole thing possibly being a federal issue, and here's what I meant by that.
