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professional athletics and have a very, very successful career. Of course, as we know that number is limited, that they all can't go on because they are not that good and they're just not...don't have that opportunity. But the only thing is I do believe that as far as...and a lot of these young people that do play their four years here at the university, many of them are bruised up, broken up, and many of them have problems the rest of their life. I think probably we should be looking perhaps something...at some type of a disability program for them. Many years ago my brother played at the University of Nebraska back in the late fifties, and back then you had a scholarship until you got hurt. After you got hurt, your scholarship was over and so...and that's what happened to him. He's never begrudged that fact. He enjoyed playing for the university. But the thing is, I guess the question I have, perhaps for Senator Chambers is I know that the football team and the football program supports most of these minor sports. And the thing is, the question I have is under Title IX, if we pay the football players, will we also be required, under the Title IX, to pay all these people participating in these minor sports? Would you respond to that, Senator Chambers?

SENATOR CUDABACK: Will you yield, Senator Chambers?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you. Senator Engel, I think it can be shown that the football program is distinct from all other programs in intercollegiate athletics. It was the purpose for which NCAA was established. It is the sport that drew in all of the money before basketball began to pay in some locations, and the direction that the football programs go is the direction the NCAA goes. It was divided into three divisions, I, II, and III, because of football. Division I was subdivided into I-A and I-AA because of football. And a lot of the statements that people make with reference to Title IX would not come into play with reference to this bill, because it would be football as a program versus all of the other minor sports. Based on documentation that was written about in the Washington Times, Nebraska profited \$22 million in football, the women's sports last year, or whatever year it was, lost \$6.5 million. So the other programs are shown to lose. The nature of the play of the football players, the injuries, the surgeries, the year-round
