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NCAA, above all others, know very well that I'm talking about business, big business, Darwinian economics. And the tension that has always existed in the NCAA between the big schools and the small schools will always be there. So the large schools that are able to give the stipend...

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...should be allowed to do it, and a start must be made somewhere. Thank you, Mr. President.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Vrtiska, followed by Senator Stuhr. Senator Vrtiska.

SENATOR VRTISKA: Thank you, Senator Cudaback, members of the body. I approach this whole process with an open mind. And I have to tell you that I think the committee, Business and Labor Committee, that sent this to the floor, did so because they had an open mind. They wanted to hear the discussion on the floor, which is what we're about this morning, which is good, certainly, for all of us. I had a couple questions I wanted to ask Senator Chambers, if I could.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Would you respond, Senator Chambers?

SENATOR VRTISKA: Senator Chambers,...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yes, I will.

SENATOR VRTISKA: ...we talked about the scholarships that football players and other athletes get, right?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yes.

SENATOR VRTISKA: What about other special privileges they get, like meals, and tutoring, and...are there other things that they get besides...just out of curiosity, because I've heard some talk about that. What do they get besides their scholarships?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Well, like you mentioned, they can eat at the training table. They get books, room, board, incidental fees.
