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to stand on this floor and act as though the Legislature has no right to consider how the residents of this state, how the attendees at the university are treated, fail to recognize what our responsibility is.

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: When the regents stop battling for those football tickets, when I see senators giving up those football tickets, when they take away that additional donation that the athletic department makes people pay for season tickets...I think it might be a minimum of \$1,500...then some seats cost exorbitant amounts, then I will say football is not what I'm characterizing it as being. The changes that occur in football move throughout the NCAA. And I'm going to show Senator Stuhr, the next time I can speak, where the NCAA already treats women's sports differently. And she and nobody else cares enough to be informed. Senator Thompson is not informed. And none of them criticize the NCAA. But when I bring a plan that can help put pressure that will improve conditions for all athletes, I...

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...am the one attacked. My plan is the one seen as the evil activity. Did you say time, Mr. President?

SENATOR CUDABACK: I did, Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Connealy, followed by Senators Friend, Maxwell, and Schrock.

SENATOR CONNEALY: Thank you, Mr. President. I yield my time to Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CUDABACK: I'm sorry, Senator Connealy. Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, Mr. President. Thank you, Senator Connealy. Senator Stuhr, and the others who keep talking about
