SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, Senator Maxwell. Members of the Legislature, as with every one of these other bills that was enacted into the law, although it forced the NCAA's hand, it did not have to be acted on. The NCAA was not sued under any of these laws. The university was not disciplined or punished under any of them. You have to understand that the NCAA is a political body like this one. There are people opposed to gambling, but because they think the public may bring a petition,...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...they're willing to say the Legislature should enact something to put on the ballot, when otherwise they wouldn't. This political body responds to an outside pressure. The NCAA is a political body that will respond to the outside pressure from legislatures. Thank you, Mr. President.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Chambers and Senator Maxwell. (Visitor introduced.) Senator Schrock, followed by Senator Schimek and Beutler.

SENATOR SCHROCK: Mr. President, members of the Legislature. Senator Chambers, if you'd respond to a question?

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Chambers, would you yield to a question?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yes, I will.

SENATOR SCHROCK: I wasn't going to talk on this issue, and I don't have much to say about it. But it seems to me that probably three-fourths of these athletes probably don't need financial help. Is there any way we could limit this to those who could show a need? Because I know there are some that don't have any resources, don't have much family support, and could be a long ways from home. Just wondered if there's a way we can narrow the focus of this to a...so it doesn't include all of them.
