with a friend of mine the other day, who is a medical doctor, and this gentleman played for the Nebraska Cornhuskers football team not very many years ago. And he was telling me that in his doctor's office he is now seeing some very young boys, eight years old, nine years old, coming in with very troubling sports-related injuries, because they're overdoing it. And their parents have gotten caught up in this Cornhusker fever, and they are pushing and pushing and pushing their kids beyond where they ought to go at that young age, because they have this dream that one day their little boy is going to play on the Cornhuskers football team. And these kids are overexerting themselves, and they're straining themselves, and they're injuring themselves, very seriously in some cases, because they're overdoing it. And I fear that, with the prospect of now paying stipends to football players, that this fever will get even worse, and that the problem that we face today is just going to get all that much more worse. So I like where Senator Beutler is trying to take us. I don't know if Senator Beutler is still on the floor, if he's left or...I had a question for him, if he's available. I don't see him here, so maybe I'll wait and let others talk, and then catch Senator Beutler, when he's back on the floor, with my question. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President, I'm not going to speak at length on Senator Beutler's amendment, because I spoke yesterday, and I support it. But here's something I want to mention at this point, because I'll relate...I'll refer to it time and time again. I think it's unfair that these players are supposedly being what they call...being given what they call a full ride. But how can it be a full ride when the NCAA admits that when all of the aid that the university is allowed to give the athlete falls short of the amount actually needed to cover the cost of attendance? If a person were a nonathlete and was given a full ride scholarship, they would give an amount of money that was needed to cover everything necessary to go to school. But that's not done with the athletes. So keep in mind what it is I'm talking about. They are contributing to the
