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Redfield, who is conversant with education matters and takes a deep interest in those things, Senator Stuhr, who down through the years that I've been here has talked about the need for more scholarship money based on need...listen to this principle that I'm going to lay out. It is amazing to me that a private association set up for the handling of intercollegiate athletics is allowed to be deemed more competent to judge this university's educational standards than the university itself. The NCAA, a private, multibillion-dollar corporation, is dictating to the University of Nebraska relative to its internal operation, its internal governance, and the Legislature sits back and is so fearful that some will say we don't even have any business as a Legislature enacting a law that relates to the university, to how the students at that university are treated, because the Legislature is as afraid of the NCAA as the university is. That, to me, should be intolerable. But since it's not, I am trying to make it possible for the Legislature to, quote, interfere, unquote, slightly, with the dictatorial action of the NCAA by encouraging other states to recognize what the NCAA has become--a very powerful, moneyed organization that dictates to and controls universities throughout this country. I don't know if Senator Raikes, Senator Foley, Senator Bourne, Senator Stuthman would consent to the university allowing its course offerings to be dictated and censored by a private association outside the university. Nobody would stand for that. But over here, where we're dealing with athletes who have no voice, yeah, they can be dictated to, and the university also. And as a result, the state has become complicit in an unjust system that in fact does exploit these players. Do you know how complex these rules are? I'm going to ask Senator Stuhr a question, because she said none of these players have a gun put to their head when they come to the university. Senator Stuhr, would you answer a question or two?

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Stuhr, would you respond to a question from Senator Chambers?

SENATOR STUHR: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Stuhr, did you mean that these high school kids, because that's what they are when they're recruited
