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can see to this whole thing, if this amendment you're trying to propose here would come into being, don't you think it would have an effect to almost destroy a lot of the programs? Because there's not going to be money to pay all these things, obviously. The pot will run dry, and then what do you do?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: But here's the point, Senator Vrtiska. Not one nickel is going to be paid out under this bill, because it...the circumstances will never come into play where the university itself will have to pay a stipend, ..

SENATOR VRTISKA: Well,...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...unless the NCAA changes its rules allowing that.

SENATOR VRTISKA: I understand. And I've heard you say that again and again, and I understand what you're saying, but times do change. Is it possible that sometime it might come into being, and then all this is going to be in place?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Well, the language in this amendment says "may."

SENATOR VRTISKA: Okay.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: The university may.

SENATOR VRTISKA: I just have one other comment to make. And I think that it's inappropriate what you said awhile ago, Senator Chambers. You said that if...football players, nobody holds a gun on them to play football. I guess Senator Stuhr said that. And you said, nobody holds a gun on farmers. But the truth of the matter of it is, last year a thousand farmers quit. And you know why they quit? Because they didn't like the program. They didn't like what was happening. They weren't making any money. And I guess if you want to take that to its furthest, you could say, well, if you don't like the program, you can quit. Now, I don't think that's the answer, and I'm not proposing that. I'm just responding to what you said about...and it kind of touches me, because you said that if farmers don't like it they can
