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you be leading the charge to revise it or amend it or repeal it, so that we didn't render...because that would be a huge travesty for the people that participate in these...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: May I answer that in my own way, but give a direct, definite answer?

SPEAKER BROMM: Yes. Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Faster than a speeding bullet, more powerful than a locomotive, able to leap tall buildings in a single bound. Is it a bird? Is it a plane? No, it's Superman. Senator Bromm, I would never invite Lois Lane to...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...jump from the top of a building if it were not my intention to rescue and save her and hold her harmless. So, yes, I would make sure that the university will not be disciplined as a result of this legislation.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Chambers. This bill, I believe, represents symbolism, and I understand that better than I have. And I think, by this amendment, the symbolism that it represents and the message it sends is much more palatable to me. And so I will conclude with those remarks. Thank you, Mr. President.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Bromm. Senator...the lights are changing. Senator Thompson.

SENATOR THOMPSON: Thank you, Mr. President. I'm pleased to see this amendment has been proposed, and I think it goes a long way to create fairness with the athletes. I just am checking on some of the language here, just to make sure it's getting to what I hope we're getting to. But in principle, I support it, and I thank Senator Chambers for bringing it. Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Thompson. Senator Chambers, there are no further lights on. You're recognized to close on Fall92, if you care to.
