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SENATOR CHAMBERS:      Thank you.      Mr. President, I want to emphasize something about this language, so that it's clear. The fact that we're dealing with a university, we know that we're talking about intercollegiate athletics, because that's what the entire bill deals with, but it says that these sports are those which participate in Big 12 Conference competition. And that keeps it from being...I don't know if they have any intramural teams over there, where fraternities and others play against each other. This makes it clear that they must be sports that are active in Big 12 Conference competition, so that it's clear the limitation of the athletes who would be covered by the amendment. And with that, I will ask that we adopt it. Oh, but one other comment. I know that sometimes Senator Thompson, Senator Stuhr, others on the floor, think that because I'm going in a certain direction, or I may react strongly to something they said, that I have not listened, that I have not paid attention. Many times a message is heard, a message is received, the message will be acted on, but it will be acted on at the proper time. There were many issues that I wanted to get into the record yesterday, even if nobody was paying attention. And I will tell you why. When these people from the university go to NCAA conferences, when the president goes to the presidents conference, when Chancellor Perlman goes to that bowl champion series commission, if any questions are asked as to why we did what we did, they can read the transcript. And if some person who thinks he or she is real tricky says, well, what about this issue, then they turn in to the transcript and say, that issue was discussed, this was dealt with, and if you read the transcript you'll see that there were things covered that you may not have thought of. So in the process of presenting my arguments, I want to compile a record. Others have commented. Others have asked questions. I encouraged Senator Friend to continue asking questions about anything on his mind, because if it was a question for him, it probably was a question for others. I have not tried to impede anybody from asking questions. I have not discouraged any question or any type of question or any opinion from being put forth, because I want as complete a record as is possible to be compiled. That is what's known as a legislative history. And I thought I should make those comments. But I'm asking that you adopt this amendment.
