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of these particular entities, the New York Yankees, Major League Baseball, for example, the Minnesota Twins, the Kansas City Royals, on their own, in their own right, they don't exist and they can't function without each other. And the reason that I have issues with the direction that we're going here is because not much of that has been brought up on the floor here. What I tried to point out yesterday is that the NCAA is indeed, like you pointed out, a monopoly. How...if you believe that the monopoly is an...in this instance, is something that needs to be squashed, like we brought up yesterday, how best to get to that point where you can squash a monopoly like that? My point to this whole thing is, the University of Nebraska's football program is not the business. The business is the NCAA, and the business is Ohio State, the business is LSU, the business is the University of Mississippi, and the business is the Big 12 in general. Senator Chambers passed us out, a couple...or about a week ago, the club seating around the country I found was really interesting. Louisiana State, \$1,000 per seat donation annually, plus ticket costs. This is what people are paying to get into club seating type of arrangements. Ohio State, \$2,000 per seat for renewals. New donors pay a one-time fee of up to \$10,000, plus the annual donation. Texas A & M, \$2,000 a seat. Alabama...Alabama, they're losing games hand over fist, \$2,500 per seat annually. This is not a bottomless pit. Someday, as Major League Baseball is seeing right now, this well will run dry. The University of Nebraska's well could run dry. The slippery slope that I see us going down...and then I'll ask Senator Chambers the question that I had for him. The slippery slope that I see us running down here is, where will it all end? I mean, where does it come to a screeching halt? Do we have to wait until Nebraska loses nine games, and then we can say, oh, by the way, maybe this approach that we've used to break up the NCAA's mentality, or their monopoly, was an incorrect one? I'm not...I don't know where we're going with this. The question...I was going to see if Senator Chambers would yield to this question about the NCAA.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Would you...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yes, I will.
