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for our colleagues how important...you're not...you don't expect a stipend to be paid as a result of passage of this bill, do you?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: No.

SENATOR BRASHEAR: And you don't expect a stipend to be paid quickly?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: That's true also.

SENATOR BRASHEAR: And you, in fact, aren't endeavoring to reach inside the university to seize governance and to mandate that the university, without any other circumstance prevailing, will have to pay a stipend, are you?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Perish the thought.

SENATOR BRASHEAR: That being the case, Senator Chambers, I wonder if you and I could return to a subject that we've discussed previously with regard to other legislation. And I would specifically address...or direct your attention to Section 4.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: I'm with you.

SENATOR BRASHEAR: Is it not, at least theoretically, possible that we go just a word too far in Section 4 when we say, any person who competes in the sport of football for the University of Nebraska-Lincoln "shall" be granted a stipend. Isn't it in fact a possibility that we have crossed the line about which this body has previously debated, where we are taking away the discretion to manage and govern that we empower, in the Board of Regents and through the Board of Regents, to the administration, such that the university could have, if they wanted to, objected to the use of the word "shall" because it's obligatory and mandatory?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Brashear, I would agree with what you've said, and, because of the discussion that you and I had, especially the possible legal ramifications of the word "shall."
