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book. This is the 1994 revision. It's put out by the General Accounting Office of the United States. This is what is the current Bible of accounting right now. But, in fact, because this is a 1994 revision, there could be a 2003 revision. We don't know that there is one in the works, but I think Senator Brown's amendment would allow those revisions to be adopted automatically into our law. So I would support her amendment and the committee amendment, and I thank you for your good work.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Redfield. On with discussion of the Brown amendment, Senator Hartnett, followed by Senators Combs, Beutler and Schimek. Senator Hartnett.

SENATOR HARTNETT: The committee amendment, not the Brown amendment.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Hartnett. Senator Combs.

SENATOR COMBS: I would just like to say that as being the prioritizer of this bill, I do support both amendments, and I echo Senator Redfield's concerns, and I like what the bill does and the amendments do, and that is place it solidly on the shoulders of the Legislature where it belongs. So I do support both amendments and I wanted to reiterate that as being the priority sponsor of the bill. I return the rest of my time back to you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Combs. Senator Beutler.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Senator Cudaback, members of the Legislature, I'm kind of a Johnny-come-lately to this whole process. It's kind of interesting that this whole thing has been driven by four women in the Legislature, Senator Combs, and Senator Redfield, and Senator Brown, and Senator Schimek. So I guess they're interested in high performance people, high performance programs. And my only input on this has been to try to fit into it some of the revisions that we've brought about to the Program Evaluation Committee statutes recognizing from our experience what it was we needed to change in order to be more efficient with our own processes, and learning from other people some better definitions and some better ways of defining things. So
