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our annual expenditures are, what is projected in the future, what happens if we go from, I don't know, our unemployment figure today we're still I believe around 3 percent. What would happen if that increases to 4 percent? Are enough dollars in the fund to do that? And so I would like to have some of that information before this bill at least reaches Final Reading.

SENATOR VRTISKA: I appreciate that and we will certainly get those together and provide them for the body. Thank you.

SENATOR JENSEN: Thank you. With that, I'll return the rest of my time back to the Chair.

PRESIDENT HEINEMAN: Thank you, Senator Jensen. Chair would recognize Senator Beutler.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Senator, just a couple more questions, and I, too, will try to get additional information and not bug you anymore, but the purpose of the money coming back from the federal government, was it...was the purpose of that money to provide for additional weeks of payment of unemployment insurance? And, you know, I was just assuming that that was not the purpose and maybe what misled me was the fact that the original bill proposed the distribution of \$34 million of that \$48 million for various programs. So I assume the purpose was not for that additional 13 weeks, or whatever it was, added on in this...by this emergency measure. But could you clarify that for me?

PRESIDENT HEINEMAN: Senator Vrtiska.

SENATOR VRTISKA: I understand, in talking to Counsel, it's a separate issue from the additional cost of the extra 13 weeks that you're talking about.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Okay. And will the federal government be giving us any money for that separate issue of the additional 13 weeks, or are they just mandating that the employers pay for that?

SENATOR VRTISKA: I understand they already have to a certain
