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tool they can to get the perpetrators to justice, and this is added to their tool chest. They'll bargain...we've heard in testimony and in stories, that this is another bargaining tool and that's not what an administrative license revocation is supposed to be. It's supposed to be solid, administrative everywhere in a uniform basis, and that's not what's happening in Nebraska the way the system has worked, and I think that it needs to be fixed. I have agreed to this part of getting tougher on the drunk drivers, but my major concern is uniformity. And I think if we don't get that kind of uniformity that we ought to pull this. If we don't have it the same in Lincoln County as it is in Burt County or Douglas County, that it's not a state policy as...and it shouldn't be in place if we can't get that kind of uniformity. This bill, I think, will do that, so I'm in support of LB 209.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Connealy. Senator Hartnett, followed by Senators Chambers and Bromm. Senator Hartnett.

SENATOR HARTNETT: Madam (sic) President, member, I think, Senator Bromm, I want to ask you a question.
