more importantly I would look for more evenhandedness in the way these prosecutions are handled so that people in Lincoln County or Saunders County are...receive generally the same approach on prosecution, so that there's not a totally different result, even though the cases and records might be the same. That, to me, is really important.

SENATOR HARTNETT: Okay. Thank you. Mr. Chairman, I'd give the rest of my time to Senator Chambers, if he so desires.

SENATOR CUDABACK: You have about a minute and a half, Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you. And since I'm next, I can finish in a minute and a half what I was going to say by way of introduction. I listened very carefully to Senator Connealy and his argument gave a reason for doing away with the death penalty, because he said when you don't have it, this matter, applied uniformly throughout the counties, you ought to do away with this whole process. Yet, I saw his name on a bill to allow lethal injection, which is supporting the death penalty. So we say you should be consistent in the lesser thing, but you need not be consistent in the greater thing where life itself is at stake. And I think it's necessary from time to time for me to point out these inconsistencies. This is not really a bill designed to bring about uniformity. Maybe that's what Senator Connealy has in mind. It's a prosecutor's bill. It makes things easy but, at the same time, it can bring a great injustice to a person who ought to be allowed to let the entire court proceedings be completed before losing...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: .. the right to drive. Under the current state of the law, the appeal stays the imposition of the punishment. That's what happens whenever you file an appeal. You can be sentenced to die today, but there's an automatic appeal that the law requires that goes to the Nebraska Supreme Court, and that stays, or stops, anything from being done as far as executing or carrying out that judgment.
