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and, if it's the worst scenario that you and others have mentioned, maybe drink again and drive again and have an accident and hurt somebody. Is that true?

SPEAKER BROMM: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Let's say the revocation occurs and you lift the privilege of driving. Is this person still in a position to drink and drive?

SPEAKER BROMM: Illegally, yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And have an accident.

SPEAKER BROMM: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And even kill somebody.

SPEAKER BROMM: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So the mere revocation does not take the person off the road, does it?

SPEAKER BROMM: Does not guarantee that.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Now if we have a person who, for whatever reason, is caught up unfairly in that system, and we've seen people who committed no crime winding up on death row so, before people make me go through a long argument to show that innocent people can be prosecuted, we could have a person who would not be guilty under the law, nevertheless, deprived of the privilege of driving based on an administrative revocation of the license. And the filing of an appeal under the law,...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...if it passes with your amendment, would not stay that revocation, would it?

SPEAKER BROMM: Not unless they got the stay from the court.
