SENATOR CHAMBERS: That's correct.

SENATOR BOURNE: And there was some...I don't know if it was outrage, but indignation anyway on part of the...on behalf of the body that we were paying all these fees to various county attorneys.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yes, that is correct.

SENATOR BOURNE: And, again, that was last year. But it seems like we've kind of shifted this year. There's a different issue, at least as it relates to your amendment. So help me. Let me walk through this and then I'm going to ask you for comments, step by step, and help to clarify the issue as to what's really going on, because I sense some confusion. Okay, an individual is arrested for DUI.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yes.

SENATOR BOURNE: And at that time then they go through this ALR procedure?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Um-hum.

SENATOR BOURNE: Okay. And then, on page 12, down there towards the bottom there's some new language in lines 19 through 27, and basically what it says is that the individual who has been arrested for a DUI can appeal a proceeding...can appear...let's see, the district court shall allow any party to an appeal to appear by telephone or at any proceeding before the court for the purposes of the appeal. So the appeal is they are resisting the revocation of their...the revocation of their license?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yes.

SENATOR BOURNE: Okay. So then the new language goes on to say, the district court may stay the revocation pending the appeal. So can you give us a sense of when exactly an appeal would come about? When would an individual appeal the revocation of their license?
