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repeat offenders it can be up to a year.

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SPEAKER BROMM: It's 90 days on a first offense. After 30 days they're eligible for a work permit or an interlock device. So if they have a job or they can show that they have a reason to drive to work, they can get a work permit after 30 days, even though the ALR procedure has kicked in. With the interlock, they can go ahead and drive with the interlock device. So I'll yield the...if he wants his time back, if there's any left, back to Senator Bourne.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Bourne, you have about a half a minute.

SENATOR BOURNE: Thank you. Okay. Now I'm understanding, Senator Bromm, that this is not the criminal prosecution. It's simply whether or not the individual keeps their license or not. Would Senator Bromm yield?

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Bromm.

SPEAKER BROMM: Yes, that's correct, Senator Bourne.

SENATOR BOURNE: Okay. So at the ALR hearing, does an individual have the opportunity to present evidence that maybe the stop was improper or that the breathalyzer machine was improperly calibrated or whatever these...

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time.

SENATOR BOURNE: ...defenses are?

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Bromm, followed by Senators Baker, Synowiecki, Bourne, and Connealy. We're discussing FA1200, offered by Senator Chambers to LB 209. Senator Bromm, and this is your third time, Senator.

SPEAKER BROMM: Sure. Senator Bourne, I will ask Senator Bourne if he would yield or wish to engage in this a little bit
