SENATOR SYNOWIECKI: Okay. Thank you, Senator Bromm. Secondly, there's been, as you know, a lot of discussion on the county attorneys' role in billing the state for these administrative license revocations procedures, and I fully understand LB 209 seeks to rectify some of the problems. Given that this ALR discussion is administrative, Senator Bromm, for indigent defendants, what is the role of the individual public defenders' offices throughout the county, and do they advocate for defendants in the administrative appeals for indigent defendants? Do you know, Senator Bromm?

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Bromm.

SPEAKER BROMM: I am not 100 percent positive, but I don't think they do get involved in the administrative side of things, Senator Synowiecki.

SENATOR SYNOWIECKI: Thank you Senator Bromm. And just... I just think there is some basic unfairness in the entire procedure of the administrative license revocation procedure as it relates to the indigent defendant, particularly advocacy at the administrative license revocation procedures. And particularly with the new law now, under LB 209's proposal, that a defendant could be found not guilty with the advocacy, for instance, of an indigent defendant with a public defender's office, be found not guilty in a criminal court matter, and without any representation in the civil matter, on the administrative level under the ALR, with no advocacy from a counsel of the services, for instance, of a public defender's office, they may still be punished, if you will, administratively under the ALR side of things. So I do think there is some basic unfairness with regard to the entire ALR process. And so I will continue to listen and I have found the dialogue to be quite educational and I'll continue to listen, but I do have some basic unfairness problems underlying the entire process of ALR. Thank you, Senator Cudaback.
