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off debate and let this atrocious piece of thing go across the board, but that's what they're going to have to do. I shall not yield. Now let me go back to what I'm talking about because there have been various aspects of the ALR system discussed, and every time a piece of it is taken out and discussed, it throws everything else into confusion. What I am dealing with is the law, as it exists right now, and the change that LB 209 would make to it. Under the law when an order of revocation has been entered by DMV, I am not talking about when a cop has taken your piece of paper on the road. I am talking about an order having been entered by DMV mandating revocation. I am talking about that because that is precisely what the language I'm trying to put back into the law deals with. When that order is entered by the director, a person can file an appeal of that order. That appeal is filed with the district court. When it is filed under the law as it exists right now,...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...the order of revocation entered by DMV is stayed. It does not take effect. Well, this organization, MADD, M-A-D-D, doesn't like that. So they want to change the system so that the filing of an appeal does not do what an appeal filing is supposed to accomplish. The filing of the appeal is to stay everything, stop it. Red light, don't go or get ticketed. What they want to do is to take that away. My amendment would restore that language to the law so that when DMV enters an order of revocation after a hearing, then a person files an appeal, after which a stay is...
