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Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Chambers, you have almost five minutes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, Senator Thompson. Thank you, Mr. President. Members of the Legislature, this is Senator Bromm's bill. He and I have been discussing it. There are several issues that I think are important enough to be discussed individually, and to achieve that, I've offered an amendment to deal with each one of them. One of the amendments I have up there is what you might call that nuclear amendment type which is to try to gut ALR entirely. That amendment is not one that I would push to the wall. It was put up there to give an opportunity to discuss every aspect of ALR by discussing each one of those sections that I would be trying to strike in my amendment. Senator Bromm and I are trying to reach an accord so that the bill can move to Select File, and some of those other matters would be taken up at that time. When I said I am willing to fight this bill till the cows come home, that was not intended to say that I will not reach any accord on this bill or any aspect of it. It was meant to say that I'm not going to roll over on the issues that I think are very important. On the other hand, my intent is not to just bog us down at this point in the session, no matter what is done or what we may consider. And as I see Senator Bromm approaching his mike, I would like to know if he would yield to a question or two.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Bromm, would you yield to a question from Senator Chambers?

SPEAKER BROMM: Yes, I would.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Bromm, have you been able to do the work that you were going to try to get done?

SPEAKER BROMM: I've touched base with some of those people that have worked hard on this bill.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Well, is it at a...have we progressed sufficiently for me to pull my amendment at this point?
