thing the Fiscal Office can do is to release the report with aggregate information, and we do that already. It can't be laid at the feet of an individual company. There is no reverse engineering, but what we do get is a better database for our tool and the Revenue Department's tool. We have the TRAIN computer model. They have the IMPLAN model. We use the IMPLAN model for revenue forecasting, and don't you think we need the best possible information for revenue forecasting? And the TRAIN model is also our way of knowing what benefits we're getting from LB 775. Shouldn't we have the best information for our computer models? Understand, we've walled it off from us and to the public. The only people that get to use it is Revenue and Fiscal for the purposes of creating aggregate reports on information about what LB 775 is doing and for our revenue projections for the future. That's a legitimate disclosure. So that's another piece that's in the bill. The Governor brought us an idea that we should try to make an adjustment for rural Nebraska because his first idea out of the box two years ago hasn't worked. There is no applicant under that project that we did for the Governor about two years ago. So to help in rural Nebraska, he had suggested a qualifying investment of \$2 million. Our current investment is three. He had suggested two.

SPEAKER BROMM: One minute.

SENATOR LANDIS: Twenty employees...what was that, a one minute?

SPEAKER BROMM: One minute.

SENATOR LANDIS: Thank you. Twenty employees and 100,000 people in the county as a rural area. We thought 100,000 is way too big. That's not a rural county. That's Sarpy County, for heaven's sake. That's Grand Island, places where there is plenty of LB 775 activity. If we're going to target rural Nebraska, it needs to be in the areas that are not using it, and there's plenty of LB 775 used in first class cities. So we changed the number to 20,000 in the county. We also upped the amount of investment to \$3 million because that's where we are. We haven't changed that number in 17 years. Three million dollars is...well, it's business as usual for a significant kind
