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We'll find out. My guess is that we'll have issue with that, and they'll say, no, no, no, that's too high. Getting a LB 775 job, no, no, no, \$18,000, it's too high. We got to be able to create a job for less than that and still let the company not pay taxes. So we'll find out, but I found that interesting. Thank you very much.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Landis. Your light is next. He waives. Senator Hartnett.

SENATOR HARTNETT: Mr. Speaker and members of the body, I went back and got the records of who was here in 1987 when this passed. Three of us are still part of this body, Senator Landis, myself, and Senator Wehrbein. We supported the bill. I thought Senator Beutler, but Senator Beutler, I think, was gone for that period of time. And, Senator Chambers, also, yes, Senator Chambers was against the bill. So I have always, like some of the...like Senator Brashear, have supported economic development. I supported LB 775. I supported last year, I think it was last year when we had what we called in the committee the UP bill, LB 260 I believe is the number. I have trouble with the number and so forth. But I think at the time, and I think Senator Landis touched on it, when we passed LB 775 for the first time I think we felt that we were under a great deal of pressure because ConAgra was saying that I'm going to take my marbles and go to someplace else. And I think also when...and Senator Vard Johnson, who sits up where Senator Burling, was the Chairman of the Revenue Committee at that time, was...I think told the body, the people that were there at that time, this really wasn't going to be used that much, and I think it's been used more than it's...that it's been than we thought when we first passed the bill. So that's kind of a little bit of history. And this is the first time, I think, that we have had...I asked the research...or, counsel for the Revenue Committee, is this the first time we've had this issue on the floor? I think it is in the 17 years' time that we've been here. But I think the hard thing that Senator Brashear is that...maybe it's good, I agree with him, it's good that we discuss this. But I think what's troubling to people is that they see a company getting tax credits, and I mentioned UP, they're getting tax credits but they're also laying off workers
