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disclosure. That's the data that will be made available to the Legislative Fiscal Office for the use of the TRAIN. And this was just to help clarify this exchange process, and to make sure that there were clear boundaries around it. Now, I think Senator Brashear takes issue with releasing the information to our Fiscal Office's computer program use. I think that's right. In fact, I think he'll offer a motion to replace this idea with some other language that the business community wrote for themselves over this...in the late fall. However, I would suggest to you that getting plan...IMPLAN and TRAIN all the data necessary to do their jobs as well as possible is in our best interests. These are data sources that we use in our policy evaluations. They should be as high a quality as possible. This amendment is a technical one. If you don't like the idea, I think Senator Brashear will give you the chance to strike this concept and replace it with something else. That will be a little bit down the way. I would suggest that we distinguish a technical amendment simply to say this idea better or right from whether or not you like the idea, because that you'll have a chance to do a little bit later on. I'd ask for the adoption of the technical amendment provided to us by the Department of Revenue, and save for ourselves the later question of whether or not you like this concept once it's well...as well written as it needs to be.

SPEAKER BROMM:      Senator Don...thank you, Senator Landis.  
Senator Don Pederson.

SENATOR D. PEDERSON:      Mr. Speaker, members of the Legislature, as I have traveled through my area of the state, one of the things that has probably disturbed more people is the word "disclosure." They say, like, we don't know what's going on, as Senator Brashear has alluded. That is a concern. So I'm really glad that we have this opportunity to clarify this issue. I think that this is a matter that does need to be discussed, and the public does need to realize that they are being informed, and perhaps investigate other methods of that information. I yield the balance of my time to Senator Brashear. Thank you.
