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performance that is required. So I'm a strong supporter of the LB 775 project and I am very convinced that the disclosure is there. But as a Revenue Committee member, what happens? Well, many, many times I see LB 775 attacked because the Legislature's Fiscal Office does not have the data in their own computer model to actually prove the efficacy for the state of Nebraska at that committee level. It's proven to the Department of Revenue, or they would recapture the funds, but the public, for some reason, has this perception that there is no disclosure. That's not true. The disclosure is there. But we need it here in our model so that we can demonstrate to the satisfaction of all the naysayers and all the doubters that, in fact, the numbers are accurate and true that LB 775 has more than paid for its way. But when I bring up the issue of privacy, I want you to look very, very carefully at the underlying amendment, FA1205, that came out of the Revenue Committee, because in fact on page 3 of that amendment, floor amendment, you see, in lines 23 and 24, you start looking at the penalties for disclosure of privacy. Now this goes across the spectrum of all of the records that we keep from health to your personal income tax records here in the state of Nebraska, and it ups the penalty from somewhere between \$100 to \$500 in fines, to a Class IV felony. That is a serious offense. So, in fact, the Revenue Committee has put into place in this floor amendment a piece which protects the privacy of not only the LB 775 companies but all of you individuals as well. I think that's an important piece. But while we protect their privacy as individuals and as individual companies, we also allow our computer model here at the Legislative Fiscal Office to utilize the records, the disclosures that we have of the Department of Revenue, and bring them into the piece so that, in fact, we can demonstrate for all of our own peace that we are using the dollars of our public wisely. What are we talking about here? My goodness, we might be talking about a performance audit. And I think it's kind of interesting that when the public is clamoring for accountability from government, and we are clamoring for accountability from...

SPEAKER BROMM: One minute.

SENATOR REDFIELD: ...businesses that, in fact, we actually have...did you say one minute or time?
