available to our Department of Revenue and...but then we've continued to have a discussion about what information is available to us. Well, I want to tell you what information is available to you and that is a report that comes out on all the incentives. You received it in your office probably the day before yesterday and it includes, on page 3, a listing of all of the proposals that are getting credits for this year. It includes, on page 36, an assessment of exactly how much the state is rebating in terms of this. We are still coming down to a discussion about how much the state is giving; that if you assume a certain amount, Senator Landis' assumption is that 70 percent of these jobs would have existed anyway, Senator Brashear would probably say maybe 10 percent of these jobs would have existed anyway, it is that assumption that underlies any analysis of the effectiveness of this program. And we are not going to be able to, even by virtue of taking in all the information, do the mind reading that is essential to accomplish what Senator Landis wants to accomplish, which is to say what the people who were making the decisions were thinking about when they made those decisions. But we are proceeding in great danger because of what Senator Brashear talked about. When you are working with businesses who are making these decisions, they are very wary. When I work the chamber when they bring people in and, in fact, I worked with...quite extensively with the Caterpillar development, I didn't even know the name of the company until well into the legislative piece of it because I...at first, they didn't want anybody to know what the name of the company was. We work with economic development specialists and consultants that do all the negotiations. If a state had more than we already have, which is very extensive in terms of performance requirements and disclosure requirements, that would probably prevent them from even beginning consideration of that state because they are so sensitive about their proprietary information. This is about whether they are competitive or not and, even the consideration, I mean for businesses that are just looking at locating in the state, even the consideration is going to alert their competitors. But if we are requiring more information than is reported in this document right now...
