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isn't good enough. This is for us to improve our public policy, and it's the real deal. We need to do the committee amendment. The replacement, essentially political kinds of concerns. Number one, is LB 775 helping rural Nebraska? And this data is going to try to break things up geographically around the state. And there's a stratification of wages. By the way, if we're...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR LANDIS: ...if we have so much disclosure as Senator Brashear described, we wouldn't need this. It's an example of the fact that we don't have disclosure that this is here. However, those are political agendas. They don't improve our model. And if you ask our staff, they'll tell you, the stuff that we're replacing in here in the Brashear amendment does not improve our public policy analysis with our computer models. It's irrelevant to the stuff that we're looking at in our computer models. It moves us forward not at all. If we want to do better decision making, we need better data. We keep project-specific information secret. But we use the data cumulatively to improve our decision making. That's exactly what we should do. And that the business community would not share with us and our computer models the data necessary to give us the tools to analyze public policy, I think is...

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time.

SENATOR LANDIS: ...dot dot dot.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Landis. We're discussing AM0879 to FA1205, the second part of the divided committee amendments to LB 608. Senator Raikes, followed by eight others.

SENATOR RAIKES: Thank you, Mr. President and members. I would like to follow and emphasize the points that Senator Landis has made. Because I think they're very good points. The Revenues Committee's whole emphasis here was on what we need to do as a committee, what we need to do as a body to help us improve the decision making, our ability to make the correct calls on business tax incentive programs.
